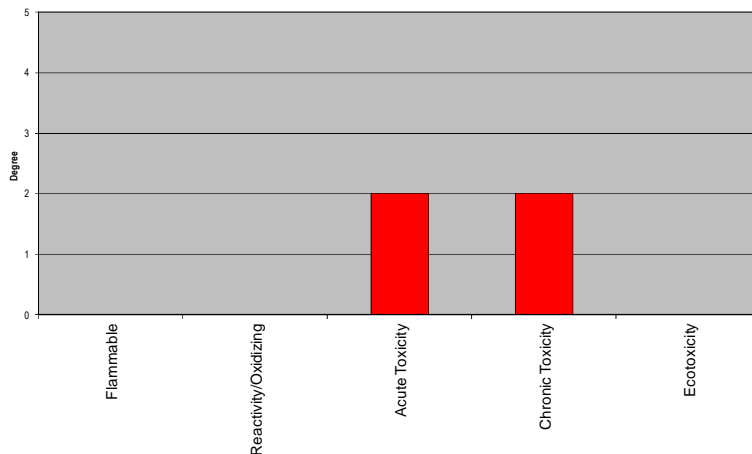

<i>General Information</i>

<b>Recommended first aid facilities</b>	Ready access to running water is required. Accessible eyewash is recommended.
<i>Exposure</i>	
<b>Swallowed</b>	IF SWALLOWED: Do NOT induce vomiting. Rinse mouth. If concerned, see a doctor.
<b>Eye contact</b>	IF IN EYES: Rinse cautiously with water for several minutes. Remove contact lenses, if present and easy to do. Apply continuous irrigation with water for at least 15 minutes holding eyelids apart. If eye irritation persists: Get medical advice.
<b>Skin contact</b>	IF ON SKIN: Wash with plenty of soap and water. If skin irritation or rash occurs: get medical advice/attention. Take off contaminated clothing and wash before re-use.
<b>Inhaled</b>	No first aid measures normally required. However, if vapours or mists have been inhaled, and irritation has developed, remove to fresh air and observe until recovered. If irritation becomes painful or persists more than about 30 minutes, seek medical advice.

5. Firefighting Measures	
<b>Fire and explosion hazards</b>	There are no specific risks for fire/explosion for this chemical. It is predominantly water and non-flammable.
<b>Suitable Extinguishing Substances</b>	This product does not burn. Use extinguishing media suited to the materials that are burning.
<b>Unsuitable extinguishing substances</b>	None known.
<b>Protective Equipment</b>	Safety boots, non-flammable overalls, gloves, hat and preferably goggles. All skin areas should be covered.
<b>Danger caused by material, its combustion products or gases produced</b>	Fire decomposition products from this product may form toxic and corrosive mixtures in confined spaces. Likely to decompose only after heating to dryness followed by further strong heating. Product of decomposition: Carbon dioxide, and if combustion is incomplete, carbon monoxide and smoke. Water.

6. Accidental Release Measures	
<b>Containment</b>	If greater than 1000L is stored, secondary containment and emergency plans to manage any potential spills must be in place. In all cases design storage to prevent discharge to stormwater.
<b>Emergency procedures</b>	The bottle size generally will prevent major spills. If a spill occurs: Stop leak if safe/necessary; Isolate area (ensure no persons inside spill area) Collect spill – see below; Transfer to container for disposal Dispose of according to guidelines below (Section 13)
<b>Clean-up method</b>	This product is not considered flammable. It can be collected by absorption onto material such as sand, vermiculite or other suitable absorbent material. Small spills do not require any special clean up method. Larger spills (e.g., 200 L) should be prevented from entering stormwater drains or waterways. If a significant quantity of material enters drains, advise emergency services.
<b>Disposal</b>	Sweep up and shovel or collect recoverable material into labelled containers for recycling or salvage and dispose of promptly. Recycle containers wherever possible. This material may be suitable for approved landfill. Dispose of only in accord with all regulations.
<b>Precautions</b>	Wear protective footwear, overalls, gloves and safety glasses to clean-up large spills. Can be slippery on floors, especially when wet.
7. Handling and Storage

<b>Handling</b>	Keep exposure to a minimum, and minimise the quantities kept in work areas. See section 8 with regard to personal protective equipment requirements.



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## 8. Exposure Controls/Personal Protection Equipment

### Workplace Exposure Standards

A workplace exposure standard (WES) has not been established by WorkSafe NZ for this product. There is a general limit of 10mg/m<sup>3</sup> for dusts and mists when limits have not otherwise been established.

### Engineering Controls

In industrial situations, it is expected that employee exposure to hazardous substances will be controlled to a level as far below the WES as practicable by applying the hierarchy of control required by the Health and Safety at Work Act (2015) and the Health and Safety at Work (General Risk and Workplace Management) Regulations 2016. ### Summary

IF SWALLOWED: may cause gastrointestinal disturbances.

<b>Acute:</b>	<b>Oral</b>	This mixture is not considered to be harmful if swallowed. Using LD <sub>50</sub> 's for ingredients, the calculated LD <sub>50</sub> (oral, rat) for the mixture is >5,000 mg/kg.
	<b>Dermal</b>	No evidence of dermal toxicity.
	<b>Inhaled</b>	No evidence of inhalation toxicity. Inhalation of mists may cause mild irritation.
	<b>Eye</b>	The mixture is considered to be an eye irritant, because some of the ingredients present are considered eye irritants in more concentrated form (Surfactants)
	<b>Skin</b>	The mixture is considered to be a skin irritant, because some of the ingredients present are considered skin irritants (surfactants) in more concentrated form.



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<b>Chronic:</b>	<b>Sensitisation:</b>	This mixture contains hydantoin at >0.1% which has been classified by EPA as a contact sensitiser. In international studies it has been concluded that hydantoin is safe to use for cosmetic purposes. (see: J Am Coll Toxicol Vol:7, 3 (1988)).
	<b>Mutagenicity:</b>	No evidence of mutagenicity for the mixture or any of its components. Hydantoin is a suspected mutagen (EPA), but is present <1%, therefore the mixture does not trigger this classification.

	<b>Reproductive / Developmental:</b>	No evidence of reproductive toxicity for the mixture or any of its components (>0.1%).

This product is unlikely to be considered ecotoxic in water or to land-based animals. Avoid release directly to the environment.

<b>Disposal method</b>	Disposal of this product must comply with the requirements of the Resource Management Act for which approval should be sought from the Regional Authority. The substance must be treated and therefore rendered non-hazardous before discharge to the environment.
